There are 270 of the original 310 entries still in the running.

After his first night's sleep for five days Coun. Frank Guest, Birmingham competitor in the Monte Carlo Rally was waiting today to hear if his 2,000 mile nightmare dash had been in vain.

Coun. Guest proprietor of the Meteor Garage, Moseley and his brother Mr. Richard Guest, left Birmingham last Friday morning. They arrived here late yesterday only three quarters of an hour behinf their schedule.

They had forged ahead, passing scores of damaged and stranded cars lining the route, and leaving behind in the snowbound Alps many less hardy competitors.

Mr. Richard Guest narrowly beat his brother in endurance, staying at the wheel for almost six hours through snow, rain and fog, which hampered progress over the last three hundred miles.

Anxiously waiting to greet them were Mr. Guests wife and Mr. Richard Guest's daighter, Josie, who flew from Birmingham on Tuesday.

" Stiff Going"

On their arrival road weary but proud to be among the first of the Glasgow contingent to get through. Mr. Frank Guest said: "It has been stiff going, particularly on the last lap. We are only likely to have lost points for being late. We shall certainly have a go at the next rally."

A crash just outside Glasgow on Friday almost spoiled the Guest brothers' chances. Skidding on a wet road, their car crashed into railings and was seriously damaged, They escaped unhurt and a staff car was sent out to them.

The trip back for the Guest's will not be so speedy they will return to Boulogne in easy stages, arriving for a channel crossing on 10th February Evenine Despatch Reporter.

THEY WAIT ANXIOUSLEY FOR NEWS OF RALLY MEN.

In the lounge of a hotel here, two anxious Birmingham women were waiting this afternoon for news of husband and father who. with their Ford car, are in the British team competing in the car rally.

Mrs Marie Guest and her niece Miss Josie Guest, flew from Birmingham yesterday to meet Coun. Frank Guest, proprietor of the Meteor Garage, Moseley and his brother Mr. Richard Guest.

Mrs Guest said she had received no news of her husband since the British competitors left Amsterdam yesterday.

Few English

Mrs Guest said that she was surprised how few English people were in Monte Carlo to see the British Competitors arrive. Altogether there were some 90 people waiting for the arrivals.

"I have been waiting all morning for news; said Mrs. Guest "Reports of ice and snow have made us rather anxious. If they do not arrive by late afternoon, we hope to hear of their progress from control posts along the route!"

Driving through a blinding snowstorm from Paris to Lyons only six starters arrived from Glasgow without penalty marks. The comparatively good weather of the rally's opening days gave way yesterday to heavy snow, and many competitors arrived in Lyons today more than an hour late.

The first"home"

Among the cars late at the Lyons control point were three British starters from Glasgow: Mrs. E. Allard and Mrs E. Wood: G. A. Duff and A.A.Patten: and J.H.Kemsley and W. Frend.

First three cars to cross the finishing line here were all French, starting from Lisbon.
